**Statement for the Record**  
**Hearing on DAV's Legislative Presentation to Congress**  
**February 28, 2017**

Commander Riley, I'd like to thank you for your testimony this afternoon and to all Disabled American Veterans (DAV) members present for their service to our nation. You are all examples of what it means to serve and sacrifice and I am grateful and appreciative of all that you have done for this great country. You are heroes among us.
